

myON Helps Michigan Educators Address All 10 Essential Instructional Practices in Early Literacy for K-3



Essential Practice #1: Deliberate, research-informed efforts to foster literacy motivation and engagement within and across lessons

myON offers:

- Reading materials based upon Lexile® levels and an interest inventory, so that students can choose their own reading materials that are interesting to them and at their “just right” reading level.
- High-quality, digital content in a motivating and engaging platform.
- Writing tools including the option for note-taking, journal tools, and a graphic organizer to help readers create a mental picture of the text’s information.

Essential Practice #2: Read alouds of age-appropriate books and other materials, print or digital

myON’s platform includes:

- Optional reading scaffolds that support and encourage independent reading, including professionally-recorded audio to model fluency, word and text highlighting, a zoom feature and an embedded dictionary.
- An interest inventory to give students a choice for age-appropriate books.

Essential Practice #3: Small group and individual instruction, using a variety of grouping strategies, most often with flexible groups formed and instruction targeted to children’s observed and assessed needs in specific aspects of literacy development

myON can be used for:

- Independent and self-directed reading.
- Small group activities for instructional purposes.
- Creating booklists within projects for individual students or groups of students to support intervention and differentiated instruction.

Essential Practice #4: Activities that build phonological awareness

myON includes:

- Professionally-recorded audio to allow students to develop a strong awareness of both phonological and phonemic awareness skills in an authentic environment such as:
 - Awareness of sounds in the English Language
 - Awareness of rhymes
 - Ability to talk about, reflect upon, and manipulate sounds
 - Developing an understanding of the relationship between written and spoken language
- A wide variety of authentic texts appropriate for emergent readers to increase early readers’ exposure to language and how sounds form words.
- Scaffolds such as text and sentence level highlighting to allow students to track the text being read and provide an accurate model for mapping speech to print.
- A plethora of early literacy titles including nursery rhymes that expose students to concepts under the larger umbrella of phonological awareness such as onsets and rhymes, which in turn help students discern individual sounds within words.

Essential Practice #5: Explicit instruction in letter-sound relationships

myON’s extensive collection provides:

- Connected text to match phonics concepts explicitly being taught in isolation.
- Annotation tools such as highlighters to enrich concepts in systematic phonics programs.
- An embedded dictionary so students can hear the correct pronunciation of words and see where the word should be broken apart for decoding.
